Duquesne Light to Invest More than \$600 Million to Improve Distribution Infrastructure

hrough its Long-Term Infrastructure Improvement Plan (LTIIP), Duquesne Light will invest more than \$600 million between 2017 and 2022 to improve, repair and replace aging distribution infrastructure to help maintain efficient, safe and reliable service to our customers. Distribution infrastructure includes the wires, transformers, substations and other equipment in your neighborhood that are used to deliver electricity to your home.

Like many other electric and natural gas distribution utilities, Duquesne Light's infrastructure expanded significantly during the 1960s and 1970s. The LTIIP will help the company to maintain its high levels of electrical system reliability as that equipment reaches the end of its expected, useful life. Duquesne Light's plan, which was modeled after industry best practices, was reviewed and approved by the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (PUC).



The LTIIP includes five main areas of work:

- 4kV Program Eliminate, convert and/or upgrade to 23kV, various 4kV distribution system lines. This includes removing poles, wires, transformers and other related equipment and installing new 23kV conductors, automated devices and other associated equipment. This program also involves replacement of aged 4kV substation equipment at various locations.
- Overhead Program Replace aged aerial cable to reduce the likelihood of failures. Aerial cable is used when multiple circuits are on the same pole. It also is used through rights-of-way with trees that may cause interference.
- Underground Program Replace aged underground cable and equipment throughout our service territory, including network transformers and associated protection equipment in downtown Pittsburgh and underground facilities serving suburban housing plans.
- Substations Program Upgrade aged substation infrastructure. Substations (see photo above) are an important link in the delivery of power from generating stations to your home.
- Highway Relocation Program Relocate distribution facilities as part of road and bridge projects by the State of Pennsylvania, PennDOT, counties, cities, municipalities or other government agencies.

Training Next Generation of Lineworkers Through Partnership with CCAC



uquesne Light, in partnership with the Community College of Allegheny County (CCAC), is now accepting applications for its 2017-18 Electrical Distribution Technology (EDT) program. The one-year program, which will begin in August 2017, is designed to prepare students for entry-level skilled craft positions associated with electric utilities. The deadline to apply is April 2, 2017.

Participants in the program will be exposed to the theoretical and practical aspects of working in an electric utility. This includes general education courses like math, introduction to information technology and AC theory, as well as the practical elements of working in overhead, underground and substation maintenance.

"The EDT program serves as the initial step for individuals interested in a career in Overhead and Underground," said Jamie Stack, Senior Manager, Transmission Operations, Duquesne Light. "We're always looking for skilled talent, and those who excel in the program and demonstrate the right abilities will be considered for future employment with Duquesne Light."
